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1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

Sree Krishna College, Guruvayur, has a rich history rooted in its establishment on July 18, 1964, by the Sree Krishna Educational Society. Initially affiliated with Kerala University, the college began with a Pre - Degree Course and later moved to the present 32 - acre campus in Ariyannur in July 1967. This relocation marked the start of its significant role in the cultural and educational landscape of Guruvayur, a temple-town renowned for its artistic and cultural heritage in South India.

The college was founded with a vision to foster higher education and holistic development, deeply intertwined with the cultural traditions of Guruvayur. Artistic and linguistic evolution, particularly in Sanskrit and Malayalam related with the poets and artists connected with the temple, is reflected in the college's commitment to preserving and promoting these languages and art forms.

In 1976, a pivotal change occurred when the Sree Krishna Educational Society was dissolved and replaced by the Guruvayur Devaswom Educational Society and shifted its affiliation to the University of Calicut. This transition paved the way for the expansion of undergraduate and postgraduate programs, significantly enhancing the academic offerings and facilities of the college.

With the expansion to thirteen undergraduate courses, six post graduate courses, two research programmes and the enhancement of its facilities, Sree Krishna College has made significant strides in advancing the academic landscape of Kerala. One of the college's notable achievements is in the field of physical education. The establishment of a sports hostel and dedicated efforts have led to the development of Olympians from the college, underscoring its commitment to excellence in athletics.

On February 28, 2005, the college earned a B++ accreditation from the National Assessment and Accreditation Council (NAAC). This was followed by a notable achievement when the college was reaccredited with an A grade on November 27, 2017. These accolades reflect the college's dedication to maintaining high standards of academic and administrative quality and continuous improvement. The institution aims to continually create an environment that promotes outstanding academic performance and encourages creative output, thereby contributing significantly to both the educational and cultural development of the region.

1.2 Strength, Weakness, Opportunity and Challenges(SWOC)

Institutional Strength

- 60 years of rich legacy as a Centre of Excellence.
- The Guruvayur Temple plays a dual role in supporting the college: it acts as a management entity and serves as a rich cultural and artistic resource.
- As a management body, Guruvayur Devaswom can provide guidance and support in organizing events, fostering discipline, and instilling values that are integral to academic and personal growth. This collaboration can enhance the college's governance and ensure that it aligns with the traditions and ethos of the region.
- The significant intake of students from coastal and rural areas brings a rich diversity of perspectives and strong work ethic to the college, enhancing classroom discussions and fostering strong ties with local communities.
- The college is bagging university ranks every year over the years and many students are getting admission in premier institutes in India.
- Sprawling across 32 acres of lush green land cut away from the din and bustle of the town, the campus offers a very conducive learning ambience.
- Award winning NSS Unit and dynamic NCC unit.
- The establishment of a sports hostel by the Kerala State Sports Council in the campus is a significant initiative aimed at fostering athletic talent; the hostel supports athletes in their pursuit of excellence. This focused environment helps students excel in competitions.
- A well maintained ladies hostel is functioning inside the campus.
- The PTA and Alumni are supportive and pro-active
- Good industry - academia linkage.
- A well-maintained library having 58886 books. In collaboration with Chakshumathi NGO, the library provides inclusive technology that enables visually impaired students to access resources equally, fostering independence and academic success.
- Fair and transparent admissions through the University of Calicut's centralized portal.
- The Department of Physics and Botany are Research Centres of University of Calicut. The Department of Commerce and Malayalam have submitted the proposal for being recognized as a Research Centre and the process is in the final stage.
- The college has a well-maintained website.
- The college has dedicated faculty members adopting an empathetic and learner centred teaching methods and approach.

Institutional Weakness

- As the college is affiliated with the University of Calicut, we have limited autonomy in designing and revising the curriculum for our undergraduate (UG) and postgraduate (PG) programs. Introducing new courses or updating existing ones requires approval from the University governing bodies, posing a challenge for us.
- We offer 19 programs, and our student enrollment is relatively high. However, we struggle to accommodate students from distant areas due to limited space in the boys' hostel, except for reserved categories.
- Currently, we have only six postgraduate programs, but there is a need to start more postgraduate programs to meet the diverse needs of students in line with the new National Education Policy.

- As our library's book collection expands and more departments evolve into research centres, the necessity for a centralised library and research complex becomes increasingly apparent.
- Despite the outstanding athletic achievements of our college students at national and international levels, our institution faces a significant deficit in essential sports facilities. Specifically, we are in need of facilities such as a synthetic track and an indoor stadium to further support and enhance our athletes' training and performance.

Institutional Opportunity

- Culturally, the Guruvayur Temple offers a wide range of artistic resources, providing opportunities for students to engage in traditional arts, music, and rituals. This exposure not only enriches the academic experience but also helps to preserve and promote the local heritage. By integrating these cultural elements into the curriculum, the college can create a holistic learning environment that nurtures both intellectual and artistic development.
- The institution plans to collaborate with government organizations to protect, document, and publicize the archaeologically significant Megalithic Burial Monuments "*Kudakkallu*" (Umbrella Stone) and "*Munimada*" (Rock Cut Chamber) both located in close proximity to the campus. Additionally, an exciting tourism project is underway to link these archaeological sites with rich cultural and artistic heritage of Guruvayur Sree Krishna Temple.
- All the departments can be upgraded to Research Departments as we have sufficient Ph.D. holders who can serve as Research Guides, especially in the realm of Four-Year Degree Programme.
- Currently, we are collaborating with Chaithanya School for the Differently Abled to enhance the lives of individuals with disabilities. In the upcoming years, we plan to expand partnerships with similar institutions to contribute to the betterment of our society.
- There is ample space on the campus to facilitate the expansion of the institution and autonomy in designing add-on and certificate courses tailored to meet student requirements.

Institutional Challenge

- Our institution is currently facing significant challenges, particularly in relation to academic freedom. As an institution governed by the University of Calicut, we encounter constraints that limit our ability to modify the curriculum.
- The trend of students migrating abroad for further studies has had a notable impact on the academic landscape of our postgraduate courses.
- To address the evolving needs of the current generation, there is a pressing need to introduce new integrated or vocational courses.
- Additionally, while we have elevated the Sanskrit and Economics departments to the postgraduate level, the absence of permanent faculty appointments presents a considerable obstacle for our college.
- Implementing the FYUGP, in line with the National Education Policy (NEP), necessitates additional classrooms for minor and major courses.
- Financial limitations stemming from the pandemic and other adversities have impeded infrastructure development from governmental and non-governmental sources.

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

Sree Krishna College, affiliated to the University of Calicut is strictly following the regulations and Syllabus and Academic Calendar of the University of Calicut. In order to adhere to the same, the College prepares its own Academic Year Plan in lieu with University Calendar. The same is distributed to the students and teachers. In addition to the University curriculum, the College offered 55 certificate courses among various disciplines to enhance the professional competency of students in respective departments. The students have recorded positive feedbacks for the same. In order to monitor the aforesaid, review meetings are conducted at the department level. Remedial Coaching, Peer Learning, Bridge Courses, Induction programmes are also conducted. In order to integrate crosscutting issues relevant to Professional Ethics, Gender, Human Values and Environment and Sustainability various programmes are conducted. Four Audit courses are offered in the first four semester of under graduate courses and student projects are also conducted. Environment day celebrations are conducted regularly, Gender sensitisation programmes, IPR courses are designed in the curriculum, Vermi compost units, Green campus initiatives, Bhoomika nature club, floristic diversity studies, 'Annapoornna', feeding the needy, are the major initiatives. The societal commitment of our institution has led us to extend our helping hand to Chaithanya school for differently abled students, Kunnamkulam Thrissur. The College offers financial aid by acting as a channel to commercialise the value-added products produced by these gifted children. College also associates with 'Mercy Cops', an NGO run by a collective of State Police officials for a better society. The selected area in the College campus was allotted to this NGO to establish a mango orchard which holds a diverse germ plasm of mango varieties. Almost all the final year under graduate and post graduate students undergo project work/ field visit/ internship in various institutions. Industrial visit/ institutional visits are compulsory for the science students. The periodic feedback was collected from all stakeholders and it is analysed, and action taken report was prepared and presented before appropriate authority. The positive criticisms analysed are duly addressed in consultation with the management.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

Sree Krishna College, Guruvayur through its teaching learning methods, always makes significant efforts to act as a "temple of learning" for the holistic development of students which is deeply connected with rich cultural traditions of Guruvayur.

The admission is conducted through Centralized Admission Process (CAP) of University of Calicut. As per the University rules, college nominate a nodal officer for under graduate and post graduate admissions and an admission committee monitors the admission process. The college strictly follow the reservation policies of Govt..of Kerala and affiliating University.

The average enrolment percentage for assement period is 85. 74.

The average percentage of seats against reserved categories is 85.87 which reflects institution's social responsibility for the upliftment of society by providing higher education to all.

The Student - Fulltime teacher ratio 19.32. The college has adopted a student centric teaching approach with suitable learner centric methodologies like experiential learning, participative learning and problem-solving methods. The peer teaching methods like "Quality Circles" programme and remedial coaching is implemented in the institution for the effective learning outcome for the advanced and slow learners.

ICT is successfully integrated into the curriculum with the support of google class rooms, MOODLE LMS and other e-resources.

The percentage of full-time teachers against sanctioned posts is 95.56. Percentage of teachers with PhD/NET is 93.99.

The internal examination cell of the institution plays a major role for implementing internal examinations in an efficient and time bound manner. Students' grievances are properly addressed and take active measures for solving such grievances with immediate effect.

Various methods are used to make aware of students about programme outcome, programme specific outcome course outcome at the beginning of a programme. The attainment of course outcomes are mapped and analysed by the faculty members through internal examinations, assignments, seminars, viva etc.

The average pass percentage of students for the end semester examination during the period of assessment is 81.03%.

Student Satisfaction Survey is conducted annually to evaluate the teaching-learning process and to bring forth necessary and possible changes in the teaching methods.

Research, Innovations and Extension

Sree Krishna College, Guruvayur has made significant strides in fostering a research-driven, innovative, and socially responsible academic environment. During the assessment period, the college received Rs. 24.9 lakhs in grants from government bodies and NGOs, highlighting its commitment to research excellence. The knowledge transfer ecosystem of college encourages students to collaborate with faculty, fostering a culture of innovation. The Entrepreneurship Development (ED) Club plays a key role by organizing events to develop entrepreneurial skills among students. The club has conducted seminars on commercial opportunities in accounting, guiding students in the production and marketing of FMCG products. The Young Innovators Program (YIP), supported by the Government of Kerala, further enriches this ecosystem by hosting workshops that encourage innovative thinking. The Standards Club educates budding entrepreneurs on quality and standardization, and seminars conducted, raises awareness about protecting innovations. The college actively promotes the Indian Knowledge System by showcasing classical arts of Kerala such as Koodiyattam, Nangyar Koothu, Kathakali, and Krishnanattam. These performances blend traditional art forms with contemporary themes, fostering cultural appreciation among students. Sree Krishna College conducted around 75 workshops, seminars, and conferences on academic, research methodologies and Intellectual Property Rights, and published 61 research papers in UGC CARE-listed journals along with 63 chapters and proceedings. The college has a strong commitment to community engagement, organizing 173 extension activities, including flood relief, anti-drug campaigns, blood donation drives, and palliative care services. Environmental initiatives like anti-plastic campaigns and beach clean-ups further underscore the dedication of college to sustainability. The institution has received 43 awards for its extension activities, including the COVID Warrior Award and Haritha Mithra Award for environmental conservation. The dedication of college to excellence is further reflected in its students and faculty achievements. These include the Second-Best Parliamentarian Award, numerous recognitions for NCC cadets, and awards for outstanding contributions in blood donation initiatives. Holistic approach Sree Krishna College to research, innovation, and community service highlights its commitment to academic excellence and societal welfare. The establishment of 9 MoUs and 71 collaborations further enhances its research and outreach capabilities, making it a leader in integrating education with community impact.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

The institute's management is dedicated to providing a well-rounded environment that supports the students' academic and extracurricular needs. The campus boasts well-equipped classrooms, science laboratories, departmental libraries, and mini-seminar halls, with dedicated Wi-Fi across the premises for seamless connectivity and resource access. The institute regularly assesses the availability and utilization of facilities to maintain a high standard of physical infrastructure. At the beginning of each academic year, modern infrastructural facilities are implemented based on feedback and suggestions from faculty members, department heads, laboratory assistants, students, and research scholars. In addition to academic facilities, the institute strongly emphasizes providing a balanced platform for cultural and sports activities. The college offers various facilities for conducting cultural activities, sports, and games. The Department of Physical Education maintains a 400m track for athletics, and a well-equipped gymnasium is available on campus. These facilities have proven effective, with students regularly achieving recognition and success at various cultural and sports events. The campus comprises fifty-six well-equipped classrooms catering to undergraduate, postgraduate, and PhD programs. Additionally, there are twenty-two staff rooms, all equipped with Wi-Fi facilities and connected to a Public Address System. The Central Library and Departmental Libraries are invaluable resources for students, automated with an Integrated Library Management Software system. Routine housekeeping works such as issue/return/renew/barcoding are done with an OPAC (Online Public Access Catalog) search facility system. The Science Departments boast safe and modern laboratories for practical work. The campus also includes two auditoriums equipped with audio-visual and internet facilities and a dedicated multimedia room in the English department. The college is equipped with three helipads regularly utilized by high-profile individuals, including the Prime Minister of the country. Furthermore, the institute is committed to promoting eco-friendliness through a comprehensive Waste Management System, Rainwater harvesting, and the utilization of Solar Power. The campus is also equipped with ramps, disabled-friendly toilets, and wheelchairs to ensure equal access for students with disabilities. Accommodation in the form of hostels is available for students, with dedicated water purifiers ensuring access to clean drinking water in classroom blocks.

Student Support and Progression

The student support system at Sree Krishna College is strengthened by scholarships and endowments sponsored by the management of Guruvayur Devaswom, alumni, retired faculty and current teaching staff. Over the last five years, a total of 7,068 students have benefited from scholarships and freeships with the total financial assistance amounting to Rs. 3,26,98,179/-. The college places a strong emphasis on capacity building and skill development, focusing on areas such as soft skills, life skills, language and communication skills and ICT competencies, ensuring students are well prepared to meet the demand of modern world. During the last five years nearly 5,717 students have benefited from such programs from these programs. Sree Krishna College also provides valuable guidance for competitive examinations benefiting many students. The Career Counselling Cell plays a pivotal role by organising numerous programs, including webinars, workshops NET/JAM coaching and Job fairs from 2019-2024. A total number of 1773 students were benefited from such programs. The College's grievance redressal mechanism ensures transparency and compliance with UGC and government regulations. This includes the Anti-Ragging Cell, Grievance Redressal Cell, Internal Complaints Committee and Committee Against Sexual Harassment. Additionally, SC, ST, OBC and Minority Cell promote

the academic and personal development of students from these communities. A total of 601 students have progressed to higher education and students placed during the last five years is 601. Additionally 95 students have successfully cleared competitive examinations. Over the past five years, students, have won 107 awards and medals for outstanding performances in sports and cultural events at the university, state and national levels. Student participation in cultural and sports activities is notable in the institution. The total number of sports and cultural programs in which the institution participated during the last five years is 171 and the average is 34.2. Alumni Association of Sree Krishna College (AASK) is a registered society (Registration number TSR/TC/56/2023) that actively supports the academic and infrastructural development of the institution. The association conducts regular annual meetings and provides support to the college in various ways. AASK serves as the umbrella association for department -level alumni groups and the college utilizes the expertise of alumni in the orientation programs and workshops where their presence and guidance serve as a source of inspiration for our students.

Governance, Leadership and Management

Sreekrishna College, Guruvayur, operates as an aided institution under the auspices of the Guruvayur Devaswam Board. Established in 1964, it aims to address the needs of the rural community and contribute significantly to the enhancement of their quality of life. The Government provides salary grants for aided courses. Additionally, under a number of schemes, the College receives UGC funds. According to government regulations, salary grants are disbursed to employees, and the director and joint director of the Higher Education Office conduct an annual assessment. The Institution also receives funding from the Non-Governmental agencies for the development of the infrastructure facilities.

The financial resources allocated by Kerala's Higher Education Department address the predominant requirements. In addition to helping with staff salaries, it supplies money for lab purchases, library publications, and scientific equipment needed for science department. Funds raised through the Parent Teacher Association and College Development Fund are used to manage the cost of maintenance and repairs for the college's facilities and grounds. The College management committee plans and carries out the college's long-term projects, while the Parent Teachers Association Executive Committee oversees the day-to-day operations.

The institutional strategic and perspective plan is adeptly implemented across diverse sectors by the College Development Committee, College Council, and the PTA. The Principal, as the administrative head, is directed by the Deputy Director of Collegiate Education, Kerala. The Principal oversees the office through the Senior Superintendent for administrative tasks and manages the Heads of Departments (HoDs) for academic activities.

This institution runs smoothly its e-Governance through automated library with integrated library management software system, ICT and physical infrastructure/instrumentation, industry interaction/collaboration, student admission through Meshi logic administrative software. The most important strategies involve academic independence, FDP programme for teaching and non-teaching staff, yearly academic audits, decentralized academic administration, and accountability through integrated feedback mechanisms from all parties involved, such as department audit committees, parents, alumni, and students. The College Council, IQAC, PTA, and CDC work together to help the Sree Krishna College fulfil its objective of offering high-quality education with holistic development, and community service

Institutional Values and Best Practices

We have explained about the initiatives taken by the college to ensure gender equality. Under various banners the institution conducts awareness programs for the students regarding the legal framework available to tackle gender related issues. Committees like CASH and WDC are very active in our campus. Green campus initiatives are given utmost importance in all our activities. The main building has solar panels connected to the grid. LED bulbs are used. The campus conserves natural water bodies and greenery in the campus. We have natural rain water recharge system in place. The water from rain water harvesting system is used by the science departments for their lab purposes. The college have conducted Green, Energy and Environmental audit for two consecutive years. The students actively involve in environmental protection activities inside and outside the campus. The institution also collaborates with other organisations in conducting such activities and they are planned with long term goals in mind. The events and celebrations strictly follow green campus protocol. The waste both degradable and nondegradable are segregated at source and are disposed properly. We also have a vermicompost plant set up by the students. The institution believes in harmony at all levels. We accommodate students from all region and ethnic backgrounds. Festivals both regional and national are given due importance. Students are encouraged to participate in events and tours to explore cultures of different regions. Financial help is extended to poor school children in the village. Scholarships are also given for children with good academic background. Emergency help is extended to staff and students who are in need and have met with unforeseen contingencies. The college has two best practices. Annapoorna is a practice the college follows to feed the poor homeless people in Kandanaserry Panchayath and Guruvayur Municipality. Under Feel N'Heal a number of activities are planned with a perspective of giving back to the society and environment. Our college was established in 1964 to promote literature especially Sanskrit. Our college has been making commendable efforts to explore and document traditional art forms and enlighten the younger generation regarding this rich culture.

By fostering an environment that nurtures cultural and linguistic heritage, the college not only honors its historical legacy but also contributes to a broader national vision of education that values and integrates traditional knowledge with contemporary learning. This alignment highlights the importance of local contexts in shaping a robust educational framework that respects and promotes India's diverse cultural landscape. The Sanskrit department actively promotes cultural and literary engagement through various initiatives, such as Certificate Course in Sanskrit and Yoga. Their focus on modernizing the Sanskrit language, including programs on computational tools in Sanskrit, reflects a forward-thinking approach to this ancient language. The Institution ensures effective curriculum planning and delivery through a well-planned and documented process including Academic calendar and conduct of continuous internal Assessment

Sree Krishna College affiliated to the University of Calicut offers 13 UG courses, 6 PG courses and 2 Research departments.

I. Curriculum Planning

Many faculties from the college serve in Calicut University's **BoS** involved in revising the curriculum as part of the NEP. The institution strictly follows the curriculum established by the University of Calicut. Every academic year begins with the **Staff Council Meeting** where the curriculum delivery for the year is planned through setting up of a **master timetable** and an **academic calendar**. **Department level meetings** are held at the beginning of each semester to coordinate curriculum delivery with the help of a teaching plan for faculty members, department-level timetable, and the overall workload of the department.

II. Curriculum Delivery/Implementation

Classroom delivery is performed through lectures, assignments, seminars, lab work, projects, internships and field work. The completion of the syllabi and curriculum is monitored and ensured by the **IQAC** through a structured **feedback system** based on NAAC directives and the teaching plan.

The **induction/orientation programme** for newcomers by renowned personalities help students to set goals and objectives in their chosen discipline. The institution offers Bridges Courses for the first-year students to support them and to bridge the gap. Each Department offers a **Bridge Course** of 10-hour duration. Effective use of e-learning tools and technology, including **ICT enabled lectures, Youtube, Moodle and Google Meet** are used for lectures.

III. Continuous Internal Assessment (CIE)

Continuous Internal Assessment is conducted through frequent class tests, assignments and seminars. The Grievance Redressal Cell is the mechanism for addressing grievances at the department and the institutional levels which plays a part in the process of dealing with the complaints including curriculum delivery and internal marks. The extensive book and journal collection in the library also plays a significant role in enhancing the curriculum. The students are given a wide range of suggestions on the **Add-on courses, Certificate courses, Audit courses and Open courses**. **PTA meetings** are held in a

timely manner to apprise students and guardians of the flow of the semester and the academic progress of the students.

IV. Documentation, Review/Reforms

The institution systematically consolidates and monitors documents for effective curriculum delivery, conducting regular review meetings (Staff Council, Departments, Gap analysis, Result Analysis). Department-level result analyses drive necessary reforms. **Teacher's diary** provides a comprehensive view of the timetable for each semester, course syllabus, detailed unit-by-unit lecture plan, mode of delivery, special events, and topics covered beyond the syllabus is regularly checked by the head of the department and is verified by the IQAC Coordinator and the Principal. **Remedial classes** are given to weaker students and **Peer Teaching** methods are also promoted. **Experiential learning** like field projects, industrial visits and internships is also conducted.

Academic monitoring by the Principal and IQAC, based on monthly reports and Academic and Administrative Audit (AAA), is in place. Monitoring of on-the-job training/internships ensures efficacy, providing an opportunity for proposing improvements. The Internal presentations and regular RAC ensure quality in PhD programs.

The affiliating university conduct external examination in the institutions as per the University regulations The institution follows the rules and procedures set by the university to ensure fairness and academic integrity while conducting external examinations.

1. Internal Assessment

As per university guidelines, internal assessment is a part of the teaching-learning evaluation process. According to the University regulation internal assessment is an integral component of how students' academic progress is evaluated. This part of the assessment, happens within the college, is designed to measure the students' understanding throughout the semester as per the syllabus published by the University.

Internal evaluation is based on:

1. Internal Examination:
2. Assignments
3. Seminar/Viva
4. Class room performance based on attendance

Internal Examination Cell and Grievance Redressal Mechanism

As per the University regulations, institution conducts two internal examinations in each semester. An internal examination cell is constituted to ensure the efficient and smooth conduct of internal examinations.

A centralized timetable is to be prepared and circulated among students one month prior to the conduct of the examinations. The format for the examination questions must follow the template set by the university to ensure uniformity. This ensures that all internal exams align with the university's expectations. The question papers and materials required for the examination are issued by the internal examination cell.

The internal examination cell is responsible for providing all the necessary items for conducting exams. Once the internal examinations are conducted, the respective subject teachers assess the answer sheets within two weeks. They then return the marked answer scripts to the students so they can review their performance. After handing back the answer sheets, teachers take time to explain the examinations questions and discuss any doubts or misunderstandings students may have about their answers or the subject matter. Once the teachers finalize the internal marks, they are displayed on a notice board for students to see. If students feel there is an error or unfair grading, they have the right to address their concerns. These grievances can be settled within the department itself. Any issues or complaints about the internal marks are usually handled within the department. The department staff or teachers work directly with the students to resolve these matters.

If a student feels that their issue was not addressed properly by the department, they can escalate their complaint to a higher committee within the college called the Students' grievance redressal Committee.

Remedial classes are conducted by the concerned teacher for slow learners and to those students who secured relatively low marks in the internal examinations

Quality circles are also formed for students to facilitate discussions and clear their doubts. These are small groups of students organized for the purpose of peer discussions. In these groups, students can work together to help each other clear doubts, enhance understanding, and prepare for exams collaboratively.

Outcome Based Education at **Sree Krishna College, Guruvayur** is a well-structured approach that focuses on defining clear learning outcomes for each course and aligning them with broader program outcomes. The use of CO attainment level calculations and mapping to POs and PSOs ensures that students acquire the intended knowledge and skills for their chosen program of study. Regular evaluation of course attainment and feedback from students help the college make continuous improvements to its educational offerings. Program Outcomes (POs), Program Specific Outcomes (PSOs), and Course Outcomes (COs) for each course offered are clearly defined.

Process of Evaluation

The evaluation of POs and COs follows a systematic process:

- **Mapping of COs to POs:** Each CO is mapped to one or more POs, indicating how a specific course contributes to the broader programme outcomes. This mapping is usually done on a scale (e.g., 0-3) to indicate the degree of contribution.
- **Assessment Tools:** The attainment of COs is measured through various assessment tools, such as internal assessments, end-semester examinations, quizzes, projects, presentations, and assignments. These assessments are aligned with the COs to ensure that they adequately measure the specific learning outcomes intended for the course.
- **Direct and Indirect Methods:** Direct methods include the actual performance of students in assessments, while indirect methods include feedback from stakeholders such as students, alumni, and employers. The combination of both ensures a holistic evaluation of the learning outcomes.

Calculation of Attainment Levels

The attainment of COs is usually calculated using a defined formula, considering both **internal assessment scores** and **external examination scores**. For instance, an institution may decide that:

- 60% weightage is given to internal assessments (based on assignments, mid-term exams, and projects).
- 40% weightage is assigned to end-semester exams.

After calculating CO attainment for each course, the results are aggregated to evaluate the **attainment of POs**.

Setting Benchmarks

Institutions set benchmarks or threshold levels for CO and PO attainment. For example:

- If 70% of students score above 60% in a particular CO, the institution may consider that CO attained.
- The aggregate of COs is then used to calculate the attainment of POs, using a similar benchmark.

3.4 Extension Activities

3.4.1

Outcomes of Extension activities in the neighborhood community in terms of impact and sensitizing the students to social issues for their holistic development during the last five years.

Response:

Sree Krishna College, Guruvayur, has actively engaged in various community service activities and initiatives through its National Service Scheme (NSS) and National Cadet Corps (NCC) units, that reflects the commitment of the institution towards social welfare, health advocacy, and environmental sustainability.

During 2019-2020, the college conducted the Anti-Drug Day Campaign and Pollution Awareness Rally, which engaged students in promoting health and environmental consciousness. The Blood Donation Campaign certified substantial participation, while health surveys and rallies raised awareness about diabetes and AIDS. NSS volunteers demonstrated remarkable empathy by celebrating Onam with Alzheimer's patients, organizing training programs in palliative care, and distributing food to those in need.

The COVID-19 pandemic in 2020-2021 required adaptation, and the college successfully transformed many of its activities to online mode. The NCC organized a webinar on International Yoga Day, and approximately 80 cadets participated in yoga from their homes. The unit also commemorated Hiroshima Day with an Anti-War Campaign, during which 108 cadets displayed peace placards from their

residences. In January 2021, the NCC celebrated National Youth Week, with blood donation camp in collaboration with the IMA and yoga demonstrations promoting physical well-being. The college collaborated with the Pain and Palliative Care Society and hosted "Rang 2021," that focused on palliative care services. The students conducted discussions and cultural activities as a part of this awareness programme. Various campaigns done on Nurses' Day, World Family Day, and Environmental Day illustrated the continued commitment of college during the pandemic.

During 2021-2022, the college resumed its outreach programmes on post-pandemic life with a COVID-19 vaccination drive in collaboration with the Guruvayur Devaswom. The cleaning of the Chavakkad Beach was done by Puneet Sagar Abhiyan, The Pulse Polio Immunization Awareness Programme was promoted through a cycle rally. The NSS launched the Thalaphalam Project, by planting Palmyra palm seeds on World Environment Day.

During 2022-2023, programmes like the Anti-Plastic Campaign, where 83 cadets raised awareness about plastic pollution, and the Anti-Drug Cycle Rally for the public. The NSS initiated the weekly Annapurna Programme, distributing over 750 food packages to the needy. The Mango Tree Plantation Programme by the NCC and Mercy cops contributed to campus greenery. Blood donation camps were organised to collect blood for blood banks.

During 2023-2024, NCC of the college reinforced its commitment to health and education through National Level Anti-Worms Campaign, by distributing deworming tablets to the public. The NSS organized an Anti-Drug Workshop for more than 5000 attendees during the CBSE District Youth Festival. Health initiatives like blood donation camps and HIV prevention campaigns highlighted the dedication of college to community health.

The Staff Club supported the needy students with mobile phones and groceries during the pandemic. The departments of History, Mathematics, Malayalam, Chemistry and Biochemistry were engaged in social welfare programmes like the distribution of hand sanitizers and providing awareness on nutrition by visiting local health centres and old age homes.

Overall, the extensive efforts of Sree Krishna College are commendable in its strong commitment to community welfare, health advocacy, and environmental conservation.

The institute's management places a strong emphasis on providing ample infrastructure to support the academic and extracurricular needs of the students. This includes well-equipped classrooms, state-of-the-art laboratories, departmental libraries, and mini seminar halls. Furthermore, the entire campus, including department premises and seminar halls, is equipped with dedicated Wi-Fi to facilitate seamless connectivity and access to resources.

To ensure a conducive environment for quality learning, the institute regularly assesses the availability and utilization of physical infrastructure. At the start of each academic year, modern infrastructural facilities are implemented, and existing amenities are upgraded based on feedback and suggestions from faculty members, department heads, laboratory assistants, students, and research scholars.

In addition to academic facilities, the institute is committed to providing a balanced platform for cultural and sports activities to foster the holistic development of its students. The college boasts a wide range of facilities for conducting cultural activities, sports, and games. The Department of Physical Education maintains a 400m track for athletics, and a well-equipped gymnasium is available on campus. As a testament to the effectiveness of these facilities, students from the institute regularly achieve recognition and success at university, state, and national levels in various cultural and sports events.

The campus comprises in 6 blocks

1. **Main block**
2. **History block**
3. **Functional English block**
4. **Chemistry block**
5. **Commerce block**
6. **H-block**
7. **Boy's Hostel block**
8. **Girl's Hostel block**

The campus is equipped with fifty six well-equipped classrooms catering to thirteen undergraduate programs, six postgraduate programs, and two PhD programs. In addition to this, there are twenty two staff rooms, all of which are equipped with Wi-Fi facilities and connected to a Public Address System.

The Central Library and Departmental Libraries serve as invaluable resources for students. The Science Departments are equipped with safe and modern laboratories, ensuring that students have access to the best facilities for their practical work. Furthermore, the campus includes two auditoriums equipped with state-of-the-art audio-visual and internet facilities, as well as a dedicated multimedia room in the English department.

The campus is dedicated to promoting eco-friendliness through a comprehensive Waste Management System, Rainwater harvesting, and the utilization of Solar Power. Additionally, the campus is equipped with facilities such as ramps, disabled-friendly toilets, and wheelchairs to ensure that students with disabilities have equal access to all amenities. Accommodation in the form of hostels is available for students, with dedicated water purifiers ensuring access to clean drinking water in classroom blocks.

The college actively promotes a culture of sports and fitness by providing facilities for a wide range of outdoor and indoor games. Outdoor facilities include football fields, cricket grounds, and a 400-meter track, while indoor games such as badminton, chess, and caroms are also catered for students. - The learning open-source management system platforms like **Moodle** with individual systems and server were also started in 2022.

- A detailed plan and estimate proposal for a fully-fledged **Central Library with a Seminar Complex within 35135 SQFT (for Rs. 4.6 crores)** has been submitted to **Pradhan Mantri Uchchar Shiksha Abhiyan (PM-USHA)** scheme.

Sree Krishna College, Guruvayur has a performance appraisal system for Teaching and Non-Teaching staff. All academic staff in the College fall in one of the three categories, which they have opted to be in: Teacher-Administrator, Teacher-Researcher, or Teacher Mentor. All teachers are first assessed on their teaching performance, primarily based on the anonymous student feedback taken per semester.

Depending on the category, they are also assessed against the expected output in their category. The academic staff concerned first fills a self-assessment form, to which his/her supervisor adds their remarks after having had a one on-one with them. A similar process is followed for both nonteaching and technical staff. Therefore, the supervisor/principal plays a bigger role in the appraisal process.

6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

6.4.1

Institution has strategies for mobilization and optimal utilization of resources and funds from various sources (government/ nongovernment organizations) and it conducts financial audits regularly (internal and external)

Response:

This institution is running as an Aided institution comes under the management of Guruvayur Devaswam Board. All the funds received from different agencies like UGC, PTA and Alumni are subjected to regular auditing by the agencies for the fulfilment of year end audit report. The office of the Director of Collegiate Education conducts regular audit on the funds/grants provided by the Govt. of Kerala. The institution takes utmost care in recording the auditors' comments and they are rectifies matter promptly communicated to the respective bodies. The Senior Superintendent and the Head Accountant are vigilant to practice the instructions and suggestion given by both external and internal auditors.

PTA contributes major fund for various developmental activities for an academic year. Funds from local bodies, are also used for college development purposes. College also gets fund from College Development Committee headed by the management. College Alumni of various department also contributes fund for the development of department including infrastructural renovation strategies. Institution also received fund from management for the development of college campus.

The resources available are helpful for any institution looking to enhance and promote the campus academic ambiance. The Government provides salary grants for aided courses exclusively to the College

as financial assistance. Additionally, under a number of schemes, the College receives UGC funds. According to government regulations, salary grants are disbursed to employees, and the director and joint director of the Higher Education Office conduct an annual assessment. The Institution also receives non-salary funding from the Government at a set rate in addition to salary grants. Each and every item on the list is used in accordance with the ceiling specified, and the government also conducts the evaluation.

The funds provided by Kerala's Higher Education Department cover the majority of the needs. In addition to helping with staff salaries, it supplies money for lab purchases, library publications, and scientific equipment needed for science department. Funds raised through the Parent Teacher Fund and College Development Fund are used to manage the cost of upkeep and repairs for the college's facilities and grounds. The College Development Society plans and carries out the college's long-term projects, while the Parent Teachers Association Executive Committee oversees the day-to-day operations. The financial allocations are submitted to the General Body meetings following the yearly audit, and they are addressed during the periodic meetings.

Every year, the Deputy Director of Education's Audit Branch conducts a thorough, independent internal audit of all pertinent establishment and financial records, with assistance from the staff of the Accounts division. In order to verify that financial statements are prepared in compliance with recognized accounting standards, audits are also performed by the Office of the Auditor General. The assessment of internal control guarantees accuracy and completeness while helping to protect resources and assets. In accordance with government rules, the Annual Accounts are audited on March 31st, the last day of the financial year. The verification process includes a methodical review and assessment of books, vouchers, documents, and accounts.

Response:

The IQAC of the College plays a pivotal role in co-ordinating the curricular, co-curricular and extra-curricular activities of the College, also being instrumental in providing infrastructural support to the College. Even though, the academic year 2021-22 was gripped by Covid '19 pandemic, the College was able to cope up with Online-Offline blended Learning with ample support of IQAC. While the Academic audit was regularly monitored by the monthly College council, the administrative audit was annually supervised by the various internal committees in the College.

Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) coordinates and supervise all the academic activities of the college. From the beginning of academic year, college will constitute an IQAC committee for the smooth functioning of various curricular and co-curricular activities. IQAC with admission committee monitor the admission in each department by the guideline of Directorate of admission, University of Calicut. Academic year plan which meet the teaching learning activities as well as evaluation schedule is prepared by the IQAC in consultation with college staff council. Induction programme for newly admitted students and exit programme for outgoing students is well administrated by IQAC. IQAC recommended remedial teaching, ICT enabled teaching for weaker students from all categories. IQAC conducting internal examination and analyse the result external as well as internal examination to resolve the gap between teaching and leering process. IQAC provides information regarding the availability of various research grant for major and minor projects, seminars conference etc. An overall scrutiny is carried out by IQAC to assure the quality of the course being provided.

The IQAC in collaboration with the teaching and non-teaching staff of the college operated a well-managed system in both curricular and administrative part of the college. IQAC take initiatives to enhance the quality of education by firm footing in the stated vision and mission advanced by college. IQAC ensure keen supervision in Academic Calendar of the college prepared by various department for the timely execution of the events focused to curricular enhancement. IQAC conducts periodic review meetings throughout the academic year to check learning process, strategies and methodologies adopted for betterment of teaching learning environment. IQAC monitoring various teaching methods adopted for student learning includes orientation to new comers, induction programme, project review , remedial coaching for slow learners, peer teaching, different club activities , conduct of certificate courses , ICT enabled teaching methods , filed visit , research oriented activities, online teaching and evaluation, Bridge courses, PTA activities, sports activities etc.in order to strengthen academic excellence. Student satisfaction survey/Performance based self-appraisal conducted by the IQAC every year ensuring the feedback from student for the identification and rectification of weaker side of the teaching learning management and administration. Result analysis was regularly conducted by IQAC team as a strategy for assuring academic quality. The IQAC is also instrumental in coordinating the availability of various research/project grants, conferences, workshops, refresher/induction programs that enhances the quality of the faculty members.

Best Practice 1

Annapoorna

Objectives

To inculcate;

- Compassion and empathy
- Community engagement
- Team work and collaboration
- Leadership skills

The Context

This program is aimed at addressing the issue of hunger and malnutrition among the homeless people of Kandanassery Panchayath and Guruvayur Municipality in Thrissur District, Kerala. Derived from the Sanskrit word, Annapoorna means “the provider of food”. This program combats hunger of the poor, fosters community well being and promotes holistic development of the students.

The Practice

Our NSS Volunteers collect lunch packets prepared by faculty members and students from all departments every Wednesday and distribute them among needy people. It fosters awareness about serving the less fortunate. Every Tuesday volunteers conduct a class campaign on Annapoorna, reminding the staff and students about bringing the food packets. This campaign is also considered as a sustainable endeavour to cultivate humanitarian values in our students. There are two collection centres arranged for the food packets. Special events are organised during festivals like Onam, distributing grocery items to poor families.

Evidence of Success

The program has been running successfully and was able to distribute 1299 food packets to the less fortunate in the community in last three years. Staff and students of our college enthusiastically participate in this program every week

Problems Encountered and Resources Required

It requires continuous support of students and teachers as it is made possible by the generous donations of them. During Covid 19 pandemic this program faced a set back in 2021 but in later years it gained momentum

Best practice 2

Feel n' heal

Objective

Under the motto "Feel 'n Heal,"we launch a series of events with the intention of giving back to society and the environment. The main objectives are:

- To acquire sensitivity to the environment and its problems.
- To engage students in environment protection endeavours.
- To create awareness about organic farming.
- To cultivate humanitarian values in students
- To be empathetic towards elders and less fortunate in the society.

Context

It is necessary to inculcate the feeling of belongingness and compassion in students towards their fellow beings and environment. There are individuals in our society who are deprived of so many skills and abilities that we possess. The institution conceives it as its duty to bring these individuals to the mainstream society and takes every effort to support them. In the present scenario of global pollution

hitting alarming levels the college makes every effort to maintain the campus and its surroundings as green as possible. The value of nature should really be understood and we should live in harmony with it so that it can continue to sustain us all into the future.

The Practice

Under the umbrella of Feel n' Heel the college organises various events and activities keeping this broad perspective in mind. The college is closely associated with a special school called Chaithanya for autistic children. It's a privately run institution and most of the students are from financially backward families. The students of Chaithanya school make notebooks, cleaning products etc. and sell them to be self-reliant and to meet the daily expenses of the institution. Our college makes every effort to support these children in their struggle for survival.

Our students are advocated to adopt ecofriendly living habits. Campus-based organic farming is encouraged among students. A Mango tree plantation area in the college campus was initiated with the help of a charitable organisation called Mercy Cops. Nearly 89 fruits plants are bedded there. 40 staff of our college are members of this charitable organisation and they financially contribute monthly to this organisation and actively participate in their voluntary work. Students cultivate various vegetables and also maintain the gardens, adding on to the natural greenery of our campus. Awareness events are conducted for our students to develop healthy organic and ecofriendly way of living.

Evidence of success

To financially support the Chaithanya Special School, our staff and students bought notebooks made by them. The college in association with Chaithanya special school conducted a cultural fest for the children and a motivational class for their parents. The chief guest of the event was Mr. Anjan Sathish the icon of Kerala Cartoon Academy and National Award winner. He being a differently abled person became an inspiration for the children and parents to pursue their dreams. The mango plantation in the campus had its first harvest. It also proved to be a favourite recreation spot both for students and public. Our teaching and non-teaching staff continue to support Mercy Cops as active members of the organisation. As part of developing ecofriendly habits, an Exhibition and demonstration on healthy drinks was conducted. Students actively participated in the event. Sanitary pad disposal causes severe environment damage. An awareness class was conducted to introduce the benefits of using reusable products like menstrual cup. 300 students attended this event. In association with Manappuram Foundation a menstrual cup distribution programe was organised for economically disadvantaged students of our college. This event addressed the problem of menstrual hygiene among BPL students and also enlightened the college community regarding the positive impact of using such products on environment. Waste management class and exhibition was organised to educate students regarding proper waste disposal. The millet exhibition and sale made the students to realise the benefits of including millets in our daily meal. They were also introduced to delicious millet receipies.

Problems encountered and resources required

Maintenance of the trees during summer seems difficult due to water shortage. Continuous support from students and teachers has to be ensured to extend help to children with special needs.

Sree Krishna College, Guruvayur was established by Sree Krishna Educational Society in the year 1964 to promote language especially Sanskrit, the cultural language of India. It is the only higher education establishment under the Guruvayur Temple Devaswom Management and is situated in Thrissur District which is known to be the cultural capital of Kerala. The literary works, artistic creations, and performing arts of Guruvayur Sree Krishna Temple are highly renowned. The college believes that it's the duty and responsibility of the institution to disseminate the cultural and intellectual heritage to the next generation. The departments concentrate on organising activities each year to promote the Indian Knowledge System, particularly indigenous literature, culture, art forms, and history. The college is making every effort to explore the cultural and intellectual heritage of Guruvayur and document it and pass it on to the beneficiaries. With this in mind, our college hosts national seminars, workshops, demonstrations, and certificate programs both on its own and in collaboration with reputable organisations and institutions.

Sree Krishna College, Guruvayur, has been actively promoting the rich heritage of Kerala's classical arts among the younger generation. As part of this initiative, the college stages various traditional art forms such as Koodiyattam, Nangyar Koothu, Kathakali, and Krishnanattam . The efforts include lectures and performances designed to educate and inspire students by showcasing the depth and beauty of Kerala's performing arts. The programs organised are of unique nature and they blend traditional art forms with contemporary social issues to impart valuable messages to the students and the society as a whole. Sree Krishan College invites eminent personalities to our college to interact and perform in our institution and the students get an opportunity to get exposed to these art forms in its most traditional way.

Various such events were organized in our institution in the previous years. Theyyam is a ritual art form performing in the northern Malabar of Kerala. It preserves ancient traditions and captivate audiences with its mystical allure. People consider Theyyam as a channel to connect with the god and seek His blessings. The webinar on this topic enlightened the students about this traditional art form of Kerala.

The Sree Sankara Jayanthi celebration was a well-organized and intellectually stimulating event that successfully honored the legacy of Adi Shankaracharya. The participation of distinguished scholars,

coupled with the engagement of students, made the webinar a valuable platform for the exchange of ideas and the dissemination of knowledge about Advaita Vedanta. The seminar underscored the importance of studying the teachings of Adi Shankaracharya, considering their relevance for future generations.

Kandanisseri Vattaparambil Velappan Ayyappan, better known by his pen name Kovilan, was a versatile writer who contributed to Malayalam literature. Every year the institution organises events in honour of this great writer whose birth village happens to be Ariyanur where the college is situated. Department of Sanskrit Conducted a National Webinar on Indian Philosophy - "DarshanaSameekshs". This Webinar consisted of six topics from Indian Philosophical traditions, featuring lectures and discussions.

Sanskrit department organised an online Lecture Series on "Life and Philosophy of Melpathuthur Narayana Bhatta. The lecture series on Kashmir Shaivism was an enriching experience for all participants, offering a comprehensive overview of this profound philosophical tradition. Dr. Ramanand's expertise and engaging presentation style allowed attendees to gain a deep understanding of the fundamental tenets of KS, its scriptural traditions, and its lasting influence on Indian aesthetics. The collaboration between Sree Krishna College and the Abhinavagupta Institute of Advanced Studies was instrumental in bringing this valuable knowledge to a wider audience, fostering greater appreciation and understanding of one of India's most significant spiritual traditions.

Koodiyattam is one of India's oldest theatre forms, rooted in traditional Sanskrit drama and performed in Kerala for over a thousand years. Known for its elaborate rituals, detailed facial expressions, and precise hand gestures, Koodiyattam uses Sanskrit as its medium. It is traditionally performed in temples by members of the Chakyar and Nambiar communities, with the Mizhavu drum providing the rhythmic backdrop. Dr. Kalamandalam Krishnendu delivered a captivating lecture demonstration that explored the performance techniques, narrative styles, and spiritual aspects of Koodiyattam. She highlighted the importance of preserving this ancient art in its traditional form while adapting it to modern contexts. Dr. Krishnendu showcased the art form's intricate facial expressions and hand gestures, explaining their significance in conveying the deeper emotions and narratives of the performance. The audience was particularly interested in the preparatory rituals performed by artists, which are believed to invoke divine blessings.

In association with Kerala Kalamandalam Kalpitha University Centre for Nagyaarkooth a performance was organised at Sree Krishna College by Mrs. Kalamandalam Sajitha on *kaaliyamardhanam*.

The Kathakali performance was a unique initiative that successfully blended cultural heritage with social messaging. By featuring the mythological story of "Poothana Moksham" alongside a thematic presentation for the Swachh Bharat Mission, the event not only entertained but also educated the audience about the importance of cleanliness and civic responsibility. The collaboration between the college and the Government of India highlighted how traditional art forms can be utilized to support national campaigns, making the event both culturally enriching and socially relevant.

The Kathakali performance of "Kiratham," a renowned episode from the Mahabharata, was staged at the college as part of this cultural initiative. - Having three helipads certainly enhances the college's accessibility for important visits. It must be exciting to host notable guests, including Prime Ministers and Presidents of the country.
- Having a unique playground that hosts various activities for local clubs and organizations really strengthens the community connection. It's a great way to engage students and residents alike in recreational and cultural activities. It is utilized by local self-government bodies and residents for training in sports, games, and athletic events.
- Faculty members and students demonstrate their social commitment by actively participating in relief efforts during natural calamities. They provide immediate assistance through rescue operations, distribution of essentials, and temporary shelter, while also engaging in long-term rehabilitation, fundraising, and community awareness initiatives. Their actions reflect a strong dedication to supporting the affected community and promoting resilience.
